A MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR & President



Creating strong families are at the core of everything we do.

We work tirelessly to achieve our mission of building a safe, Northern society where women, girls and families can realize their full potential. And we do this by advocating for more safe and affordable housing and daycare spaces, providing women and children shelter from family violence, spearheading youth empowerment programs, and much more.

We know we are stronger together. This year, we met with other women's organizations to discuss how we can better collaborate, started discussions with the Fort Smith Day Care Society to establish a needed day care, held meetings and training with other NWT shelters, partnered with Aurora College on the experience of women seeking Emergency Protection Orders, and provided support to Fort Good Hope and Iqaluit to help stabilize or establish a women's shelter in these communities.

This was a year of firsts: the first year we operated Housing First for families, with 15 families placed in supportive housing and nearly 40 children. Another first was our new ownership of the NWT Family Centre, a free space where staff focus on mental and physical wellness for every family by providing an inclusive space for play and learning as well as parent support.

Advocacy efforts were primarily focused on raising awareness of urgent northern housing needs. We provided recommendations to the Federal government on a National Housing Strategy and rallied on Parliament Hill for housing funding and were thrilled when the government announced additional support for transitional and supported housing, dedicated funding for women, and creation or repairs to shelter spaces for women and children in the North.


We made great progress on our strategic plan by creating a more balanced, diverse board with younger Indigenous representation, established policies for a board code of conduct, enhanced our programs and services through client feedback, and worked on succession plans and efficient management of our capital assets to ensure the long-term sustainability and health of the organization.

None of our work would be possible without an incredible team of dedicated staff, Board members, community partners, government support and generous donors. Together, we are sending a strong message to women and families across the Northwest Territories that we are standing with you to make a difference and that real change is possible when we work together.





YWCA NWT Programs and Services



Providing women with a safe, supportive place to go and ensuring families have a roof over their heads are two of our main priorities, but we do so much more! Learn more about our programs and services.

Family Violence Shelters

- Alison McAteer House, Yellowknife: this 12-bed facility often has a waitlist and accepts women from across the NWT and the Kitikmeot Region of Nunavut.
- Sutherland House, Fort Smith: this 8-bed shelter provides safety from violence and emergency housing for women.

Children & Youth Services

- Dudes Club, GirlSpace and Project Child Recovery: These leadership programs promote healthy coping strategies, build self-esteem through group activities and volunteering, and provides an opportunity for youth to come together with peers in a safe, accepting space.
- Affordable after-school care: YWCA NWT is the largest provider of licensed child care in the NWT, providing care at most Yellowknife schools for children aged 4-10.

Transitional & Emergency Housing

- Rockhill Family Housing: Staff provide support to assist clients in acquiring skills that will enable them to stabilize their families and living situations, and move into permanent housing. Demand for housing is strong and there is often a long wait list.
- Lynn's Place: This safe, affordable housing option for women who have experienced violence and their children offers support and onsite programming and services to help them stabilize their lives.
- Emergency Housing: Due to the major demand for affordable housing options for families, YWCA assists with placing families and women who have experienced violence in emergency housing to ensure they are not homeless.






